Passover Perusings

As we prepare for Passover here are some thoughts and traditions to consider:

“Moses killed an Egyptian straw boss, fled Egypt in fear of his life, then married and lived for years as a shepherd and political refugee in the nearby wilderness. He had a child, and only then was able to experience the intense and fiery God-energy toward freedom that transformed the rest of his life. (The story intertwines the birth of children and the birth of freedom, as if to teach that at the root of both is new potential, whether biological and personal or political and historical; as if to teach that the biology of spring and the sociology of freedom are in some deep sense the same.)” -from *Seasons of our Joy* by Arthur Waskow

Should I observe Passover for 7 or 8 days?

The Torah commands an observance of seven days of Passover. Many Jews in North America and all Jews in Israel follow this injunction. Some Jews outside of Israel celebrate Passover for eight days. The addition of a day dates back to 700-600 B.C.E. At that time, people were notified of a holiday's beginning by means of an elaborate network of mountaintop bonfires. To guard against the possibility of error, an extra day was added to many of the holidays. Today, a dependable calendar exists, allowing Jews to know when holidays start and end. However, the process remains ingrained in Jewish law and practice for some Jews living outside of Israel today.

What foods to avoid:

There are two major Jewish groups in the world, Ashkenazi and Sephardi. When it comes to Passover, Ashkenazi Jews and Sephardic Jews have very different food traditions. All Jews, both Sephardic and Ashkenazi, prohibit the eating of chametz during Passover as directed in the Torah. Chametz includes any food product or recipe made with the following grains:

Wheat, Oats, Rye, Barley, Spelt

These grains are prohibited if they've had contact with water/moisture for longer than 18 minutes, which leads to rising or “leavening.” Leavening agents, like yeast and sourdough, are also considered chametz.

In addition to chametz, Ashkenazi Jews traditionally prohibit the consumption of *kitniyot* during Passover. These items, known commonly as rice, corn, millet and legumes, have been banned for centuries by Ashkenazi Jews. The origin of the ban is unclear; it's thought that perhaps kitniyot were considered too similar to grains. (Rabbi Stiel's addition - many liberal Jews do eat kitniyot today)

Dr. Jeff Levin, Scholar-In-Residence

We are thrilled to welcome back Dr. Jeff Levin, a former Temple Beth Shalom member. Dr. Levin is a Baylor professor whose research and writing beginning in the 1980's pioneered the study of religion, spirituality, and health. He is an internationally known writer, a biomedical scientist, and religious scholar. His research and writing for over 30 years have been instrumental in broadening the perspectives of social scientists, physicians, and public health professionals about the connections among body, mind, and spirit.

Friday April 1, Shabbat Service at 7:30 pm

Jeff Levin will share a D'var Torah on the weekly Torah portion, parshat Shmini.

Saturday, April 2, "How to Love God" Lecture, Havdalah, Reception at 7:00 pm

Dr. Levin will speak about his recent book *Upon These Three Things: Jewish Perspectives on Loving God*. In this book, Dr. Jeff Levin summarizes what normative Judaism says about what it means to love God, how we go about doing so, and how this affects our lives and our world. The evening will include Havdalah and an opportunity to catch up with Jeff. There will be wine, sweets, fruit, cheese and crackers to enjoy as well. Jeff's visit is sponsored by the Adult Education fund and the Temple's Endlich fund.

An epidemiologist, by training, Dr. Levin holds a distinguished chair at Baylor University, where he is University Professor of Epidemiology and Population Health, Professor of Medical Humanities, and Director of the Program on Religion and Population Health, at the Institute for Studies of Religion. He also serves as Adjunct Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Duke University School of Medicine.



February 3, 2016, Board Meeting Notes and Highlights

- Rabbi Stiel's D'var Torah noted that in last week's Torah portion the Jewish people receive the Ten Commandments. This week's portion, Mishpatim, focuses more on the fine details. Rabbi Stiel drew attention to Exodus 23:2 which teaches us to be careful regarding our judgments (neither to favor the powerful or the poor). She reminded us that we are concerned with, and on a search for, the truth.
- There are currently approximately 10 individuals working with Rabbi Stiel on conversion, and the Board discussed providing those who are converting with a mentor from the congregation.
- The Board's Nominating Committee announced that current Board member Alan Parker is nominated for Vice President and Patty Kahn, who will finish Alan Parker's term. The vote will take place in June at the Temple Annual Meeting.

March 2, 2016, Board Meeting Notes and Highlights

- Rabbi Stiel reported on her recent experience participating in a panel discussion at Washburn University on death and dying.
- The Temple library, downstairs' lobby and Rabbi Stiel's office will be getting new furniture to include three sofas and six large chairs, and a new refrigerator will be purchased for the Temple kitchen as the current one is failing and cannot be fixed.
- The Board voted unanimously to allow an outside group sponsoring a march against gun violence to walk from the Temple parking lot to Gage Park, if that route is ultimately chosen.


Next Book Club Book and Date

***In the Courtyard of the Kabbalist* by Ruchama King Feuerman, Sunday, May 15 at 3:00 pm.**

A middle-aged former Lower East Side haberdasher moves to Israel where he becomes, much to his own surprise, the assistant to a famous old rabbi who daily dispenses wisdom (and soup) to the collection of seekers gathered in his courtyard. There he meets a young American woman. Into both of their lives comes a Muslim.

Contrasting religious and political portraits of Mustafa, a lonely 55-year old Muslim who works on the Temple Mount, and Isaac, a 43-year old Orthodox Jew who has emigrated to Israel, both middle-aged, unmarried misfits working at sacred jobs under a religious leader, the author creates a compelling connection between two small individuals living on opposite sides of the divide, each valued for uniqueness as a human being.

The Kabbalist's Courtyard serves as a microcosm of Jewish communal life as various individuals in need arrive seeking help or miracles from Rebbe Yehuda, a kabbalist described as having a gift for analyzing difficulties of the soul. (Available on the internet for less than \$5.00)

Through training, community support and - most importantly - building personal relationships, the Circles community can help Circle Leaders - people who are ready to do the hard work - escape the bonds of poverty. Additionally, Circle Leaders and community members are working with local, state and national leaders to end poverty through policy and structural changes. Through Circles of Greater Topeka, people from all over the community and from all walks of life are coming together to begin the work of eliminating poverty in Topeka and Shawnee County.
