Reflections after the Orlando Shooting

As modern day Jews we live in the shadow of the Holocaust. It is in our psyche and affects our understanding of the world. It is always there as a vivid and loud warning that nightmares can come true, and it serves as a constant reminder of what happens when people do not speak out against the ills they see in society and in government.

I suspect that it may be this shadow of the Holocaust as much as anything else that leads Jews in the United States to be so engaged in political discourse and activism. When people say that one should just trust in God that things will get better or that humans will act humanely more often than they will not, Jews today remember what can happen when we do not legislate societal protections. So Jews in the United States tend to be very engaged in the political process. Issues such as concern for minority rights, separation of church and state, and social welfare reform have long been among the key political concerns of our community. Our commitment to them grows out of a combination of the lessons we get from Jewish history and Jewish values.

Now we have a new shared horror, and it is one that we share with the rest of the United States: a growing frequency of mass and/or active shootings. *USA Today* reports that since 2006 there have been more than 200 mass killings, most of these involving guns. *The Washington Post* (June 18, 2015) notes that “a report published by the FBI last year, studying active shooting situations between 2000 and 2013, found that these kinds of incidents were happening more and more recently. The first seven years of the study found an average of 6.4 active shootings per year, while the last seven years of the study found that number jumped up to 16.4 incidents per year.”

We are a nation that is in pain from all of the killing. The majority of Americans favor greater gun protections today and we Jews are among those pushing hard for these changes, but what legislation is best for us remains a divisive issue in America. I invite you to visit the <http://www.rac.org/gun-violence-prevention> to see the actions that the Reform movement supports, and I encourage you to share your own convictions with your elected officials. Be active in trying to bring about change. We are so fortunate to live in a country in which we can voice our opinions and shape policy.

How sad that we live with so many killings today. Our tradition teaches us that human life is infinitely precious. We, as a Jewish community, must continue to come together to give each other comfort and solace through these rough times. While, as I said, certain issues are particularly important to us, we are also a diverse community who have always held a variety of opinions on important issues – all the way back to the majority/minority opinions given in the Talmud. Unlike certain religious groups today, we do not ask people to swear allegiance to a political perspective. We do not have to be of one opinion on how best to handle gun violence (or any other concern) to stay together as a community who shares concern for one another.

May God who makes peace in the heavens help us to find peace here on earth, and may we do our part to help make our country more peaceful and safe. – Ken yehi ratzon.


- Lawrence Jewish Community Congregation (LJCC) comes to our sanctuary.

Inserting Our Own Creative Voices in the Text: Writing Midrashim Class

Sunday, July 10, 10:00 – 11:30 am

A very exciting idea was suggested by Rabbi Stiel to help celebrate and specially mark services on the eve of August 19. The idea is to invite those interested to meet to study part of the August 19 weekly Torah portion (Vaetchanan; Deuteronomy 3:23 - 7:11), be guided in writing our own midrash and then for us to share these in some fashion during the service on August 19.

As most of you are probably aware, a midrash is a creative "take"....a between the lines commentary....on a story, or fact, or words that appear in the Torah. It allows us to creatively imagine what might have been occurring "behind the scenes," so to speak. An example that has always touched my heart is the story of God's sadness over the necessity of drowning the men and horses of the Egyptian Army in the Red Sea, so that Moses and Israel could escape them and slavery, and go on to Sinai and to their destiny. A *midrash* need not be long and complex.

Rabbi Stiel will share some midrashim on this portion and help us think about some of its the themes at 10:00 am on Sunday, July 10. There will then be time for some writing and sharing. There is no commitment demanded in terms of actually writing a midrash as a condition for learning how to do so in this class.

Please give this your strong consideration and join us at 10:00 am on July 10! How wonderfully creative....and personally engaging with Torah....it would be were some of us offer the promptings of our minds and heart in this manner at that special service! 
The Forgotten Refugees



A Tale of Love and Darkness, a memoir by prominent Israeli writer, Amos Oz, parallels stories of his youth and of Israel's birth and early years. It is the story of a boy growing up in war-torn Jerusalem, the story of an adolescent whose life is changed forever by the suicide of his mother, the story of a young man who leaves his community to join a kibbutz, become a writer and an active participant in the political life of a nation. The book consists of a series of concentric circles. Events are sometimes retold, each time at a closer range. As the circles get ever smaller and closer to the core of his life, Oz opens up his long-held memories and allows his reader to share his triumph over them.

Securing our Future–The Maimonides Rabbinic Fund

Temple Beth Sholom has had a full-time rabbi since its founding in 1928, and we are indeed fortunate to have Rabbi Stiel serving as our rabbi for the past 10 years. At our 2013 Annual Meeting, those present voted to establish the Maimonides Rabbinic Fund with an assessment of a minimum of \$5/month (\$60/per year) on each family in our congregation to provide funding to assure we will continue to have a full-time rabbi. In 2017 we will begin negotiations for a new contract with Rabbi Stiel.

The monies in this fund are maintained separately from other Temple funds; they are not part of our annual budget, and they will only be used to help us offer Rabbi Stiel a new contract or to fund the search for her replacement should it come to that.

This is the only assessment we have. It is separate from our dues. If you have not done so this year, please send your contribution marked for the Maimonides Rabbinic Fund to the office or include it along with your monthly, quarterly, or annual dues. Contact the Temple Office if you are not sure. To continue to have a full-time rabbi and to insure the future of our congregation, it is vitally important that we all respond to this assessment.

While you're out at garage sales, please be on the lookout for reasonably priced baskets (medium to large size) for next year's Silent Auction (similar to the ones we used this year). We ran out of good sizes this year, and need everyone's help in restoring our stock of baskets. Thank you!

UPDATE ON CAMPAIGN TO COUNTER HATE

As you are aware, the Congregation decides at our Annual Meeting every year whether or not to continue the Campaign through the ensuing year and, if so, whom the beneficiary(ies) will be. The only parameter is that the beneficiary(ies) be a population against whom Westboro Baptist Church directs its invective.

Over the past 5 years we have raised an amount somewhat short of \$10,000. The recipients of our efforts have included: The Anti-Defamation League, The Topeka Aids Project (now known as Positive Connections), The Southern Poverty Law Center, Topeka Center for Peace & Justice, The Kansas Equality Coalition, The Jewish Community Relations Council, and The Jewish War Veterans of the United States. As you might imagine, all have been grateful for and buoyed by our support. Our recipients for this past year were: The Jewish War Veterans of the United States and The Kansas Equality Coalition. For this coming year, the congregation elected to divide our proceeds between the regional Anti-Defamation League Office in Omaha and the regional International Rescue Committee in Wichita.

To my mind, the amount that we raise each year is secondary to the importance of each of us, individually and together as a congregation, standing **against** human devaluation and **for** human dignity and social justice. Contributors are free to participate at any level with which they are comfortable....pledging between \$0.05 and \$1.00 (or more if desired) for every week that we are picketed before/during Friday evening services throughout the year. If you are not currently participating and wish to do so, please notify Lorne Ruby.


