Scholar in Residence: Cantor Ellen Dreskin

Cantor Dreskin is one of today's pre-eminent Jewish teachers and leaders. She will lead Shabbat worship and teach classes, for both adults and children.

Cantor Dreskin notes, "I've been invited to lead worship and teach in a wide variety of congregations and cohorts; I've had the chance to learn from and collaborate with amazing artists and friends; I've coordinated conferences, run Religious Schools, created and run a graduate level educational program; and I've learned from every opportunity.

I strive in my teaching, consulting, and worship-leading to put tools in the hands of congregants, lay leaders, educators, and clergy that will enable us all to be more mindful, proactive, and creative in regard to the role of Judaism in our lives.

I believe that communal worship is a time when clergy have the largest number of congregants in a single room for a limited amount of time, and it is worth both effort and resources to use that time to acknowledge deep truths, change perspectives, build relationships, rejoice and mourn, learn, and inspire action. Taking communal worship and ritual seriously (though not literally), and allowing (and expecting) it to make a difference in one's life can affect one's world-view, and bring positive change to the synagogue, the home, and the community at large, for the benefit of all involved. 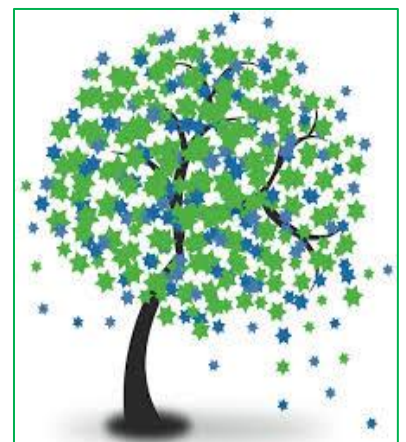
January and February Tzedakah will go to Jewish National Fund

Let's see how many trees we can plant in Israel! \$18 buys a tree. In honor of Tu B'Shevat (February 10 this year), the New Year of the trees, the 8th grade class has picked JNF Trees for their tzedakah and invites you to help them purchase trees. Planting trees in Israel is a beautiful way to show we care about Israel and the environment. In fact, JNF has been planting trees in Israel for over a century. It connects Jews to the land, and it literally plants a stake of hope and optimism in the future of Israel. JNF has planted over 250 million trees in the land of Israel. JNF continues to forest the land to help prevent soil erosion and improve the land.

Did you know?

JNF helps with water retention in Israel, too. It has added more than 12% to Israel's water supply, satisfying the needs of 1.2 million citizens, And now recycles 80% of Israel's waste water. But there is more to be done. Israel's population is growing rapidly and water-starved countries around the World are turning to Israel for solutions.

Jewish Summer Camp Scholarship Requests Due Soon

We will once again be offering scholarships to every youngster in our community who needs the financial help and is going to an approved Jewish summer camp. Last year the gifts were \$500 to each camper who went for 2 weeks and \$1000 for 4 weeks. We will try to match that this year, but it will depend on the number of applicants for these limited funds.

To apply, you must e-mail Rabbi Stiel a request for campership funds at rabbi@tbstopeka.org by **January 15**. Please include the name of the Jewish overnight camp your child will be attending and the dates. You will be notified of the amount we can give. The funds will be sent directly to the camp.

Our campership funds come from the Temple, the Topeka–Manhattan Jewish Federation, and a yearly gift from the Pozez Endowment Fund. Other camp scholarships may be available through the camps themselves, through the Jewish Community Foundation of Kansas City, and for first time campers, www.onehappycamper.org.

PJ Library Information for Parents and Grandparents

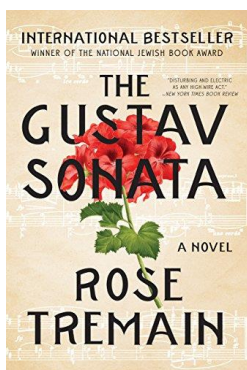

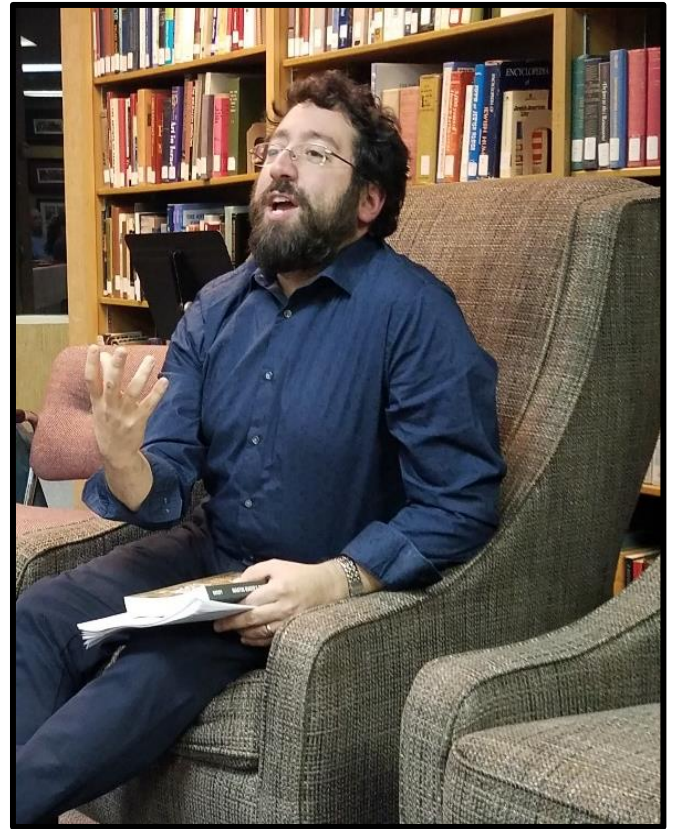

Sheldon School Clothes Drive

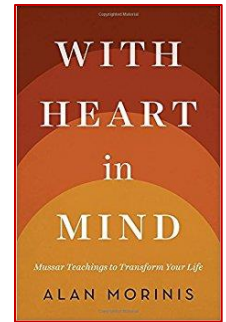
Sheldon Headstart School Principal Jennifer Norton says they appreciate all the help Temple Beth Sholom has given them over the years. Their children need:

Historical Corner by Jack Wisman

After a two month hiatus, I am back writing the Jewish history update! (Don't you just love the word hiatus? It's one of my three favorite words which are, now that you ask, plethora and mauve and of course, hiatus.) But I digress!

It has been mentioned that I know a little about cemeteries. I know I do and they are such interesting places, so I have decided to discuss cemeteries again.

Beth Tikvah, the Jewish section at Mt. Hope Cemetery, was developed much more recently than the section at the Topeka cemetery. The Topeka cemetery was established in the early 1870's.

Harry Endlich and David August, both prominent businessmen, purchased ground at Beth Tikvah in 1953. The earliest burial was Sophia Dauer (Harry's mother-in-law) in August of 1955.

Now Mt. Hope and Beth Tikvah is used much more than Topeka Cemetery. Next time I will talk about the oldest Jewish Cemetery in Kansas, in all places, Eudora.
