Beineinu – Between Us By Rabbi Moti Rieber

Limnot yameinu, ken hoda, v'navi l'vav chochmah Teach us to number our days, that we may get a heart of wisdom. -- Ps. 90:12

The word "*limnot*" in the above quote is translated in several ways: "measure" our days, or "treasure" our days (as in a song that I often sing at *shiva minyanim*, services after of a loved one's death), or, as in this translation, "number," or "count."

This verse has special meaning at this time of year, as we literally count the days between Passover and Shavuot in an ancient custom called "counting the Omer."

As with so many of our Jewish holidays, this practice has (at least!) three components: an earth-based/year-cycle component, a historical/national component, and a spiritual practice component. In Lev. 23, the Israelites are instructed to bring an "omer" (a unit of measure) of the first of the spring harvest to the priest, who waves it around as a wave-offering. And then in v. 15:

And you shall count for yourselves from the morrow after the sabbath [i.e., the holiday of Passover] from the day that you brought the omer of the wave offering; seven complete sabbaths shall there be: to the morrow after the seventh sabbath shall you number fifty days and you shall offer a new meal offering to GOD.

An offering like this - from the first of the spring harvest, before the person is even allowed to get the use of it - is meant to acknowledge and express gratitude for God's sovereignty over the whole process, "an acknowledgement that, without God, [the Israelite's] abundance and sustenance would not be possible" (Rabbi A. Brian Stoller, in the introduction to *Omer: A Counting*, described below).

I imagine that in an agricultural milieu such as ancient Israel, it would be easier to keep in mind God's provenance, directly dependent as they were on natural circumstances. Yet even they were instructed to count. How much more valuable could such counting be to us, who are more distant from such daily/seasonal miracles!

The second element is historical, as counting the Omer marks the transition from Passover to Shavuot, or from slavery/degradation to revelation/elevation. "Let my people go so that they may serve me," Moses says to Pharaoh. Passover recounts the "letting go," and Shavuot, in late May this year, the "serve me" part. The Omer is the bridge between the two, as the Israelites are transitioned out of the mindset of slavery in preparation for Sinai.

And the third element of counting the Omer is as a spiritual practice. The Kabbalists (Jewish mystics) overlaid the structure of the seven *sefirot* (divine emanations) over the seven weeks of the Omer -- each of the seven *sefirot* aligning to one of the seven weeks. So, on week one, we would consider/meditate on *chesed*/lovingkindness, the second week *gevurah*/judgement, the third week *tiferet*/beauty, and so on.

According to tradition it is very important to count every day. In fact, according to halachah (Jewish law) if you miss a day, you are not supposed to say the brachah/blessing on subsequent days – although you can still count!

Counting the Omer is one of those practices that tended to get dropped in Reform circles, but like some other such practices, it seems to be coming back. I recommend a new book, *Omer: A Counting*, by Rabbi Karyn D. Kedar, a Reform rabbi in the Chicago area (available through the CCAR). Modeled on the kabbalistic practices I described early, it is based on an original set of spiritual principles: decide, discern, choose, hope, image, courage, pray. Each corresponds to one of the seven weeks. I will be using this book during teachings in April and May.

People who have meditation or mindfulness practices know how central to that practice the simple act of counting is. If we do nothing more than, as the psalmist says, "*limnot yameniu*" – count our days - we will have reclaimed the Omer and made it into a mindfulness practice for ourselves. If we then add further elements – the nightly blessing, self-reflection, spiritual study using resources like Rabbi Kedar's book – then we will have truly reclaimed this ancient custom as a meaningful practice for ourselves.

*76 Years After Auschwitz: Stand Together *

Keynote Address:

Megan Felt, Life in a Jar: The Irena Sendler Project Norm Conard, Lowell Milken Center for Unsung Heroes

"The Steadfast Courage of Irena Sendler, Fearless Rescuer"

By Norm Conard and Megan Felt of the Life in a Jar: the Irena Sendler Project and the Lowell Milken Center for Unsung Heroes

The State of Kansas, led by Governor Laura Kelly, memorializes the victims of the Holocaust. Founders of the American Gathering of Holocaust Survivors and Their Descendants recognized that the lives of citizens are vulnerable to the power of elected officials. Their years of many efforts resulted in the government supported Yom HaShoah observance.

Governor Laura Kelly will present the Kansas Proclamation for the Days of Remembrance, which includes the following: "...the Holocaust was the state-sponsored, systematic persecution and annihilation of European Jewry by Nazi Germany and its collaborators...the people of the State of Kansas should always remember the terrible events of the Holocaust and remain vigilant against hatred, persecution and tyranny; and the Days of Remembrance have been set aside for the people of Kansas to remember the victims of the Holocaust, as well as to reflect on the need for respect for all peoples..."

Megan Felt was a high school student in Norm Conard's class when her life was changed by Irena Sendler. Irena Sendler was a Polish social worker who acted fearlessly during the destructive and brutal years of the Holocaust. In 1999, Megan Felt and her classmates wrote the play "Life in a Jar" for a National History Day project. "Life in a Jar" is the story of Irena Sendler, who risked her life repeatedly to rescue Jewish children from the Warsaw Ghetto by placing them in hiding. Those she saved would have been deported to Treblinka, a death camp.

Life stories of brave persons can transcend time and remind us of the persistent need to defend human rights and freedom. Megan Felt said of Irena Sendler, "She challenged us to continue her story and inspire others. This is a tremendous but rewarding task we will all try to achieve for the rest of our lives." By making it their life's work to share the story of Irena Sendler, Norm Conard and Megan Felt have found their way to make the world a better place. Norm Conard is now the Executive Director of the Lowell Milken Center for Unsung Heroes in downtown Fort Scott, KS. Megan Felt is the Program Director. Norm and Megan work with educators around the world to help students conduct in-depth primary research while creating inspiring projects that share the stories of unsung heroes.

Kansas' clergy, lawmakers, and students will be participating in the service. Holocaust survivors, World War II veterans, and second-generation sons and daughters will be recognized. Registration and login information will follow. (www.lowellmilkencenter.org)



Merry Christmas: Not a phrase that many Jews use very comfortably, but it is a phrase that we are familiar with. As a small Jewish community, we have all been wished a "Merry Christmas" by many different people and for many different reasons. We have come to accept this greeting by saying "thank you," or "the same to you," or maybe "happy holidays," or even "and a Merry Christmas to you." We understand that the greeting is in no way malicious; it is just that person's way of a warm seasonal greeting.

The Burger Stand which was located at College Hill, and which has recently relocated to Brookwood Shopping Center, is a restaurant that specializes in gourmet burgers. This past year, the restaurant created several new gourmet burgers for the holiday season. One of their new burgers was named the Latke Burger. I believe this thoughtful addition to the menu served two purposes. First, the burger included the Jewish Community in a positive and public way during the holiday season and second, the burger brought attention to the small but vibrant Topeka Jewish Community. The Burger Stand did not advertise the Latke Burger as a kosher burger; in fact, there was no indication in any way that this was a kosher offering. The only thing the Burger Stand did was to include the Jewish Community in the holiday season with a special gourmet burger. In fact, the Latke Burger was even offered before Hanukkah, which allowed the Jewish Community to enjoy it during "our" holiday season.

It seems to me that the Jewish Community should say "Thank You" to the Burger Stand for their consideration and inclusion, not criticize the restaurant for the burger not being kosher. The majority of our Jewish Community does not keep kosher, and those who do, simply will not eat this Latke Burger. Sometimes a simple "Thank You" goes a long way. Had we said, "Thank You," instead of the Latke Burger is not kosher, the Burger Stand would know that we appreciated their thoughtfulness.

When a person, or a business, tries to do something nice and considerate, we should think first and respond in a positive way. Next time, maybe we should simply say, "Thank You."



JUMP Nehemiah Assembly on April 26, 2021

This year at the 2021 JUMP Nehemiah Assembly on April 26 at 7:00 pm, we will be asking Mayor Michelle Del La Isla, City of Topeka to support the Affordable Housing Trust Fund with a dedicated revenue source of \$1 million per year, so that we can build the necessary affordable housing needed for Topeka. We will also ask for the Shawnee County Commission to fund around \$80,000 per year to help create more Oxford Houses in Topeka so that we can support recovering addicts as they transition from programs back in the community. This is a new initiative this year in mental health and addiction. Oxford House has a 65% rate of prevention from relapse compared to most programs which have a 30% rate of prevention. The problem of drug and alcohol addiction has increased in the past year due to the COVID isolation. Oxford house can help provide the necessary tools to make recovery long lasting.

We will not be asking anything for the Pay Day Lending program, as that is a statewide initiative, and though much progress has been made this year, it looks like it will be next year before legislation will be passed. This is the first year that hearings have been held on lending reform, as it is usually killed in committee by the pay day lending industry and their lobbyists. This year, because JUMP got a grant, we were able to hire our own lobbyists and major banks lent their voice to the effort. Bills were introduced both in the House and Senate in 2020.

The project SAVE is moving forward and has been funded by the Shawnee County Commission, so again, there will be no ask on that this year.


The JUMP Nehemiah Assembly will be online this year, and we are even looking at an option of FM radio and people attending in a parking lot to watch while safely distanced in their cars.



We are hoping to get 20 people from Temple or people you know in your daily life to attend (you plus three others...so they all count for Temple). The more people attending, the greater our people power will be to ask for these justice issues in Topeka.
