### **Reflections of an Interim Rabbi**

As I write this, last Friday was our first outdoor service. About 30 people showed up, despite the threatening weather. We were able to give birthday and anniversary blessings, and to acknowledge our graduates, Drora Neff (Christine Montgomery) and Joey Rieber.

I could really sense how excited everyone was to be there. The eagerness to be together again palpable. Even though we did not serve food, people hung around after the service to catch up with their friends.

As I come to the end of my service here at Temple Beth Sholom, I have conflicted feelings. It is hard not to feel disappointed that I did not get more of a chance to get to know the members of the community. After all, there's only so much personal connection one can develop on the other side of a Zoom prayer service.

On the other hand, it is probably just as well that you had an interim rabbi for this weird year, as opposed to hiring a new rabbi right away and having him or her try to get to know everybody from a distance. I was able to meet and work closely with several people, especially the Board of Directors under the leadership of Alan Parker, and the Religious Services Committee under the leadership of first Julie Petrucci-Treen and then Sarah Roth. I got to know the people with whom I planned the High Holy Day services and the Passover Seder, as well as those who came to adult ed. And we had a couple of very meaningful lifecycle events as well.

I think the excitement with which people greeted this first in-person service shows that the congregation is in a good place going forward. Every synagogue (and probably every church) in the country is wondering if the people will still be there when in-person activities resume. Temple's members will be there as you are eager to be there.

Another thing I see as a strength, is the great core of young leadership in the congregation. The Blintze Brunch would not happen without this leadership. I will note further that a number of these young leaders are Jews by choice. I say this only to note that where a lot of Jews-by-birth

See belonging to Temple (or not) as coming from a sense of obligation, these young leaders are here by choice - literally. That means that there is something vibrant and meaningful that they find here.

I think this dynamic says something interesting about liberal Judaism in our time. There is a famous book by a Buddhist teacher with the title, “Zen Mind, Beginners Mind.” This refers to having a sense of openness, eagerness, and a lack of preconceptions. I encourage everyone to try to maintain that sense of “beginners mind.” It is that sense of wonder, of eagerness, of engagement brought into Jewish life by people who choose to be there that makes it vibrant for all of us. Jews by choice bring us a great gift.

This is probably the smallest Jewish community I have ever served or been a member of. I know how easy it is to think of what we do not have – more Jews, more infrastructure etc. Yet TBS has a vibrancy that can be missing from communities much larger than this one. Maybe it is because people know they have to help out if the congregation is going to thrive. It comes down to this: people here really care about each other.

I encourage everyone to think, not of what is missing, but of the strengths that serve as the cornerstone of this community. Because I can tell you, they are there. And it starts with the people.

Thanks for letting me walk with you for part of the way.

### Church Using Temple

They will be adhering to strict cleaning and social distancing guidelines.

Dear Rabbi Moti:

When thinking about how to write this letter to you, we looked back through your year from May 2020 to now. You have taken tremendous time and effort in guiding us, teaching us and comforting us during this time as our interim rabbi.

In August, you lead us for your first Shabbat service. This is also when you hit the ground running, meeting with the Religious School Committee and the Social Action Committee, you attended a Zoom Temple Beth Sholom Board meeting and met with the Religious Services Committee to plan the High Holy Days services. You encouraged everyone to “be in touch.” In September, you wrote your first bulletin article and acknowledged the “seismic shift” when Rabbi Stiel departed and encouraged us to reach inside and find our inner strength, resilience, and spirit. In October, you held an “open sukkah” which provided the opportunity for members to visit the sukkah, shake the lulav and etrog, and to meet and greet you (with masks and social distance). In November, you helped us to remember Jewish values to guide our actions at the voting booth. To wrap up the first half of the year in December, you offered an adult education class discussing what Hanukkah celebrates and then you participated in the Religious School’s Hanukkah Celebration.

In the new year, you discussed the interfaith “ground rules” of praying which is inclusive to all religions and helped us move forward as part of the interfaith community. In February, you facilitated Rabbi Simcha Raphael’s Scholar-In-Residence weekend, “Judaism and the Mysteries of Life, Death and the World Beyond.” In March, you discussed the opportunity for Jewish exploration and celebration of Women’s History month and introduced us to several Jewish women who have made significant contributions to the Jewish People. You conducted “Third Thursday with Rabbi Moti,” providing explorations of topics in Jewish thought and text and the topic for March were the Pesach texts. You also led a very lively second night seder via Zoom and challenged us to think about “Would you rather” questions. In April, you participated in the State of Kansas Holocaust Commemoration and led a Thursday with Rabbi adult education class titled “Reconstructionism 101.” In May, you led a spirited outdoor Temple service, and you led the “Third Thursday with Rabbi Rieber” class on Shavuot.

There is so much we are thankful to you for, and this is only a brief overview. On behalf of the Temple Beth Sholom Board of Directors, Committee chairs and members, and the entire congregation of Temple Beth Sholom, we would like to extend our sincere gratitude and thanks to you, Reb Moti.

# CALENDAR OF JEWISH HOLIDAYS

## 2021-2022 5782

### DESCRIPTION OF OBSERVANCE

There are three major branches within Judaism: Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform. All three consider the holy days to be special religious events. Each has its own practice of observance regarding work and school on holy days. As a result, the number of days which a holy day may be observed varies from person to person.

**The Jewish Sabbath (Shabbat) begins each week before sunset on Friday and ends after sunset on Saturday.**

**All Jewish holidays begin before sunset of the previous evening. It is important that schools avoid conflicts on the eve and the day of the holiday.**

### STUDENTS AND STAFF WILL PROBABLY BE ABSENT FOR THESE HOLY DAYS, AND SHOULD NOT BE EXPECTED TO PREPARE ASSIGNMENTS OR FOR EXAMS.

#### ROSH HASHANAH – Jewish New Year

*Sunset Monday evening – September 6, 2021 through sunset Wednesday – September 8, 2021*

Rosh Hashanah is the beginning of the Jewish year. It is the first of the High Holy Days and marks the start of the ten-day period of penitence and spiritual renewal.

#### YOM KIPPUR – Day of Atonement

*Sunset Wednesday evening – September 15, 2021 through Thursday evening – September 16, 2021*

This is the most holy day in the Jewish year. It is devoted to fasting and prayer, as people ask G-d and each other for forgiveness.

#### PASSOVER (Seders – first two evenings) – Festival of Freedom

*Sunset Friday evening, April 15, 2022 (First Seder) and sunset Saturday evening, April 16, 2022 (Second Seder). (First two days: sunset April 15 through sunset April 17. Full Passover holiday sunset April 15 through sunset April 23, 2022).*

The Seder is a family ritual service that occurs on the first two evenings of Passover. Students should not be expected to prepare assignments or for exams on these nights. The first two and last two days of Passover are holy days, when students and staff may be absent. Passover celebrates the liberation of the Jews from Egyptian bondage. During this eight-day holiday, many Jews refrain from eating bread products and eat matzah (unleavened bread) instead.

### STUDENTS AND STAFF MAY BE ABSENT FOR THE FOLLOWING HOLIDAYS:

#### SUKKOT – First two days

*Sunset Monday evening – September 20, 2021 through sunset Wednesday – September 22, 2021*

Sukkot is the Jewish festival of thanksgiving and harvest.

#### SHEMINI ATZERET

*Sunset Monday evening – September 27, 2021 through sunset Tuesday – September 28, 2021*

Shemini Atzeret is the eighth day of Sukkot, on which special memorial prayers are said.

#### SIMCHAT TORAH

*Sunset Tuesday evening – September 28, 2021 through sunset Wednesday – September 29, 2021*

Simchat Torah celebrates the conclusion of the yearly cycle of reading the Five Books of Moses and its beginning anew, thus demonstrating that study is a never-ending process.

#### PASSOVER – Last two days

*Sunset Thursday evening – April 21, 2022 through sunset Saturday – April 23, 2022*

*(full Passover holiday sunset April 15-April 23, 2022- see above)*

The last two days of Passover conclude the celebration of Passover.

#### SHAVUOT

*Sunset Saturday evening – June 4, 2022 through sunset Monday – June 6, 2022*

Shavuot celebrates the covenant established at Mount Sinai between G-d and Israel, and the revelation of the Ten Commandments.
