Rabbi's Column

I have always loved fall. I like the cool weather, the intense beauty of the leaves, as they turn and start to fall. Autumn has a deeper resonance, the older I get. There is a wistfulness about it, a remembrance, whether vague or more painful, of lost or forgotten dreams. A sense that, by this time of year by this time of life, what we have is what we are going to

get. We can either accept that or even be happy with it or fight against it, as much good as that will do us. Fall encourages in us an acceptance of things as they are.

This sense of impermanence, or transitoriness, is the basis of the Japanese design aesthetic of wabi sabi. It is hard to translate, but it basically means, the beauty of imperfection. When you have a clay pot and it has a design flaw, or when you have a piece of lawn furniture or art, and it starts to rust, or weather, and it adds to the beauty of the piece; that's wabi sabi. The weathering itself becomes part of the art. The aesthetic puts us in mind of the world not as we imagine it to be, or as we think it should be, but as it is. I think wabi sabi is the aesthetic of fall.

This is also the time of year when Jews traditionally build the sukkah, the temporary hut that we are meant to live in for the week of the holiday (but which most people only eat their meals in). There is something deeply meaningful about leaving all our possessions behind, our creature comforts (even if they are only 30 feet away!) and spending a week, as it were, under God's protective care.

I bought my sukkah the year I was ordained, which is a few years ago now. It is showing the wear: the wood is rotting a bit and the screw holes need reinforcing. I could replace it, and if it gets to the point of collapse I probably will, but I can't help feeling that I would lose something precious, if I just bought a new one. The wear is part of the lesson. Yes, I have a wabi sabi sukkah.

In Jewish thought, the sukkah is also used as a metaphor for times to come, *sukkat shalom*, the canopy of peace, when humanity will be united under God's universal sukkah. These two concepts, the beautiful melancholy of autumn, and the world living in peace, are connected. It is the recognition of our vulnerability, of life's transitoriness, that can lead us to give up our insistence on being right and bring us to a willingness to live in peace.

What we need, my friends, is a wabi sabi politics. A sukkot politics. An autumn politics. For when we touch that deep core of beauty, of vulnerability and acceptance, we can stop being part of the problem and start living in the solution. Which is, right here, right now, at this moment. In all its beauty, and it is wistfulness.


items, certificates, classes, or crafts. This should be the largest committee, so we need lots of volunteers!


October Tzedakah Recipient is Doorstep

Doorstep provides these emergency services: food, clothing, rent, transportation, prescriptions, and utilities.

Emergency services are provided to people based on need, perhaps their home burned to the ground, they have been laid off or have become disabled. Those who are put on disability can get services while they wait for services from the government. 90% of the clients are at or below poverty.

Checks can be sent to Temple with Doorstep in the memo line.

Remember to bring your food bags for the High Holy Day Food Drive for Doorstep (ending October 12) to the office during Temple Beth Sholom's office hours, 9:00 am to 12:00 pm or to Einstein's.



Just a reminder, at the 2013 Annual meeting, the congregation approved establishing a Maimonides Rabbinic Fund to assure continued rabbinic leadership at Temple Beth Sholom.

This assessment amounts to \$5 per month per family or \$60 a year and started with our fiscal year beginning June 1, 2013.


